Modernism in Spanish America there is a critical tradition associated with Rub n Dar o the leading modernist figure who effectively inaugurated the movement with his collection of poems and stories *Azul* (1888) a radical departure from previous traditions his mature work *Cantos de vida y esperanza* (1905) incorporates his heightened awareness of world events. Modernismo is a literary movement that took place primarily during the end of the nineteenth and early twentieth century in Spanish America best exemplified by Rub n Dar o who is also known as the father of modernismo the term modernismo specifically refers to the literary movement that took

place primarily in poetry this literary movement began in 1888 after the publication of *Azul*.
